

## 2010 MEMORIAL LECTURER MICHAEL LEVENSON

Michael Levenson is the William B. Christian professor of modern literature and critical theory at the University of Virginia where he has taught and written since 1979. His most recent book is *Modernism* (Yale University Press, 2007). In addition, he is the author of *Modernism and the Fate of Individuality: Character and Novelistic Form from Conrad to Woolf* and *A Genealogy of Modernism: A Study of English Literary Doctrine, 1908-1922;* editor of *The Cambridge Companion to Modernism;* and coauthor of *The Spectacle of Intimacy: A Public Life for the Victorian Family.* 

Professor Levenson also has written a number of published or forthcoming essays on Eliot, Joyce, Orwell and James, and he has written on topics from the Victorian period.
