T.S. Eliot

T.S. Eliot was born in St. Louis, Missouri, on September 26, 1888, of a family distinguished for its contributions to the city and its institutions. In his later years, Eliot often spoke appreciatively of St. Louis. He returned in 1953 as a Nobel Laureate to express his gratitude to an audience assembled at Washington University, an institution founded a century earlier by his grandfather, William Greenleaf Eliot. In a booklet commemorating this occasion, the poet acknowledged, "St. Louis affected me more deeply than any other environment." Eliot died in London, England, on January 4, 1965, widely acclaimed as the most important poet of our century.
